***Distinguished Speakers and Guests,***

***Ladies and Gentlemen***

1. Indonesia values SDG 16+ as a very useful enabler in our continuous effort to attain all goals in Sustainable Development Goals. It is imperative for Indonesia to attain these targets, thus it will give more rooms for us to catalyze our effort to reach the rest of the goals in SDGs.
2. The majority principles prescribed SDG 16 are consistently aligned with our national priorities. Indonesia has implemented various policies and measures in backing our effort to create more credible, accountable, and more inclusive governance. To gain more trust from the society, we have produced policies that enable more public participation in Government’s decision making process. Apparently, such approaches have not only increased our level of accountability, but also have amplified the overall level of Government’s working effectiveness.
3. Public participation also serve as an accelerator for our institutional reform agenda. The high demand from the public for more responsive and transparent government will push the bureaucracy to change the way it works. Implementing inclusive SDGs is not an easy task, it is rather an evolution that requires active participation and engagement from every

stakeholder, including government sector, CSO and media, philanthropy and business sector, to experts and academia. This is easier said than done.

4. The demand for good governance and better public services is the reason that President Joko Widodo and Vice President Jusuf Kalla were elected. Taking into account the geographical and population challenges, the government is implementing an inclusive development program including the policy to develop Indonesia from the periphery.
5. Indonesia firmly believes that principles of good governance could not be fully implemented as long as all practices of corruption are not eradicated. Therefore, Indonesia has taken matters related to all forms of corruption eradication very seriously. This strong determination have showed meaningful results, indicated by the exponential amount of state funds/ assets that have been saved every year as a result of the prevention and settlement of corruption cases in court. Several agencies and institutions in support of corruption eradication have also been established, among others the Corruption Eradication Commission (KPK), the Financial Transactions Report and Analysis Centre (PPATK), and the Witness & Victim Protection Agency (LPSK). Indonesia has also created a National Strategy on Corruption Prevention and Eradication 2012-2015 that includes asset recovery management and regulations.
6. However, our endeavour encounters challenges. This includes efforts to recover assets from overseas. Indonesia is not alone in facing such challenges. Therefore the roadmap should further elaborate strategies on recovering stolen assets as well as asset recovery through bilateral dan international cooperations.
7. In this regard, we appreciate the good cooperation with Switzerland Government with our Ministry of Finances in the field of financial information transparency sealed two weeks ago. The success of this cooperation will be highly relevant to the agenda of good governance as well as better public services.

8. Indonesian is committed to be the forefront pioneer and a role model to achieve SDGs, including on target 2 in SDG 16+. To address child violence, resources are being prioritized to develop an inclusive and integrated protection and welfare system that

provides support to vulnerable families and communities. The Government of Indonesia is promoting a range of parenting programmes to support caregivers to develop strong, loving and nurturing relationships and to promote discipline. Integrated Service Center for Protection of Women and Children have been established in most districts, to receive reports from community members. In addition, a Community-based Integrated Child Protection Mechanism has been initiated in more than 130 villages in 34 provinces of Indonesia, aiming to strengthen the participation of community members in preventing violence and changing social norms.

9. As a reflection of the highest commitment and leadership of the President of the Republic of Indonesia to implement SDGs, a Presidential Decree has been enacted recently. The Ministry of National Development Planning/Bappenas has been assigned as the Coordinator of the National SDGs implementation. My office will coordinate the formulation of SDGs Roadmap 2016-2030 and the Five-year National Action Plan.
10. I see greater opportunities provided in today's event. Indonesia wishes that the roadmap compliments other initiatives so that all goals of SDGs be implemented.
