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Georgia, as the OGP co-chair country, will encourage OGP participating countries to link the OGP to the SDG Agenda (especially SDG 16) by encouraging the development of national action plan commitments that relate to realization of better outcomes in governance, access to justice and socio-economic rights.

In Georgia, reform priorities include the rule of law, introduction of e-governance, the fight against corruption, promotion of open governance, transparency of government decisions, and increasing the proximity and availability of public services.

Georgia's Public Service Halls and Community Centers became the hubs of public services that serve not only to the major cities but the rural areas as well. This ensures fast, efficient and comfortable delivery of up to 400 public services on a one-stop-shop basis.

Since the 2030 agenda rests on core OGP principles and there are considerable complementary objectives between the OGP and the SDGs, we see the Partnership as one of the most flexible and innovative implementing platforms for these Goals. Additionally, the Goal 16 which aims to "build effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels," is high on Government of Georgia's agenda as we work hard to comply with the requirements set by the European Union Association Agreement.

Georgia adopted the Antidiscrimination law, the standalone Juvenile Justice Code, ratified the Council of Europe Convention on preventing and combating violence against women and domestic violence.
